Rural residents also suffer from diminished access to cutting edge research and treatments. A third-generation Georgia physician, Dr. Sumner has served in rural Georgia most of her career, practicing medicine in Washington and Johnson counties before becoming dean in 2016. Dr. Sumner came to MUSM as a community faculty preceptor in 1989, became associate dean for rural health in 2014, and has held a succession of leadership positions over the years. She has served as hospital chief of staff and nursing home medical director, as well as a board member, chair, and president of numerous community and statewide professional organizations.

Sharad Ghamande, MD, Georgia Cancer Center, Augusta University



Dr. Ghamande joined the Obstetrics and Gynecology faculty in 2000. He began his studies in 1985 at the Seth G.S. Medical College in Bombay, India with a focus on General Obstetrics & Gynecology. He went on to specialize in gynecologic Oncology and has become a champion in his fight against gynecologic cancer. He believes that clinical trials and health care delivery research leads the way to improvements in patient's outcomes in quality of life and survival. As an oncologist, he has always strived to bring new options to our patients, educate them about the process and empower them to make choices that could better their care, and perhaps advance progress in cancer treatments. Bradley Carthon, MD PhD, Winship Cancer Institute, Emory University



Dr. Carthon graduated from Hampton University in 1996 with honors as a Biology Major and Chemistry Minor. He went on to receive his M.D. and Ph.D. degrees from Harvard Medical School and Harvard University in 2005, where he studied the roles of cell cycle proteins in mammary gland and breast cancer development. He remained in Boston for his residency in Internal Medicine at the Massachusetts General Hospital.

Dr. Carthon joined Winship Cancer Institute of Emory University in Atlanta in 2011. He serves as a member of the Genitourinary Oncology Group and has served as a member of the Phase I Early Discovery Unit. His interest is in novel therapeutic targets and clinical trials for genitourinary and other solid tumors. He is principal investigator on numerous genitourinary and phase I clinical trials. He is currently Associate Professor of GU Medical Oncology and serves as Chief of Hematology Oncology at Emory Winship Midtown. He is also currently serving as Interim Director, Division of Medical Oncology.

He has an interest in health disparities and has served as Chair of the Winship Cancer Institute Health Disparities, Health Literacy and Minority Accrual Committee.

Crain Garrot, MD, Georgia Cancer Specialists

Dr. L. Crain Garrot is a board-certified physician in medical oncology, hematology and internal medicine. A member of the American Society of Clinical Oncology and the American Society of Hematology, he has clinical interests in the management of general oncology and hematology with an emphasis on gastrointestinal cancer, genitourinary cancer and hematologic malignancies.

Anand P. Jillella, MD is a Professor in the Division of Hematology and Medical Oncology and the Medical Director of the Winship Cancer Network at Winship Cancer Institute of Emory University. Brian Rivers, PhD MPH, Morehouse School of Medicine

Dr. Rivers is Professor and Director of the Cancer Health Equity Institute at Morehouse School of Medicine (MSM). Dr. Rivers is nationally and internationally recognized as a leader in health disparities research and a retired member of the National Institutes of Health (NIH) National Advisory Council on Minority Health and Health Disparities (NACMHD). Dr. Rivers is a behavioral scientist with a broad background in dissemination and implementation science and public health, with specific training and expertise in methodologies commonly used to address health disparities and advance health equity.



Rodolfo Bordoni, MD, Georgia Cancer Specialists

Dr. Bordoni is the Director of the Clinical Research Program for Georgia Cancer Specialists; Lung Cancer Research Program Leader and Phase I Clinical Trials Program Director, both at Northside Hospital Cancer Institute. He is the founder and former co-Chair of the annual Atlanta Lung Cancer Symposium (ALCS) and the founder and Chair of the annual Atlanta Precision Oncology Symposium (APOS). He has been a National Cancer Institute investigator since 1992, the Principal Investigator for over a hundred oncology clinical trials and a member of the Northside Hospital and Cancer Institute Multidisciplinary Thoracic Oncology Group.



Chirag Jani, MD, Phoebe Putney Medical Center

Chirag Jani, MD, joined Phoebe's Cancer Center team in 2003. He practices hematology, oncology, palliative care and serves as a physician for Phoebe's Hospice service. Dr. Jani is the Medical Director of Hematology and Oncology, and the Chief of Staff for the Cancer Center. Dr. Jani strongly believes in value-based medicine and providing medical care to patients and families as a whole unit.



Pooja Mishra, MBA/MHA FACHE, Grady Health System

Mary Egan, BS CCRC, University Cancer & Blood Center



Ajay Nooka, MD MPH FACP, Emory University



THE PATIENT'S PERSPECTIVE



Kimberly "Michelle" Smith, Patient Survivor and Advocate

Michelle is a Breast Cancer Survivor and Clinical Trials Patient Participant. At just 36 years old, Michelle was diagnosed with breast cancer in her left breast with a suspicious area on her right breast. Michelle made the difficult decision to have double mastectomy surgery on November 2, 2021, she froze seven (7) embryos December 2021 and January 2022 she entered a clinical trial, completing four rounds of intense chemotherapy. A component of her trial included the research team tracking neuropathy in African American women under treatment using the drug Taxane (docetaxel). Michelle believes that clinical trials are important because they allow medications and treatments to be effectively targeted for African American women. Michelle believes that education, connection, communication, and engagement are some of the first steps to increasing African American and other minority participation in clinical trials that can advance medicine, and target illnesses and diseases more effectively.



Sheryl Gabram, MD MBA, Georgia CORE

Dr. Sheryl Gabram is currently the Chief Scientific Officer for the Georgia Center for Oncology Research and Education (CORE) since January 2021 and in this role oversees research and clinical service initiatives. She serves as the principal investigator on a CDC Cooperative Agreement Federal Award titled "Georgia Colorectal Cancer Screening Project" 2020-2025. She is currently collaborating with Yue Guan PhD from Emory University's Rollins School of Public Health on a project to increase the reach and uptake of screening for BRCA associated cancers in rural public health clinics in Georgia and Latinx women.

Christopher Cross, PhD, Director of Health Equity Strategies, ASCO

Dr. Cross is a biomedical engineer, anatomist, neuroscientist, population geneticist, cancer biologist, LGBTQ+ advocate, and entrepreneur. 

Mark Fleury, PhD, Principal, Policy Development-Emerging ScienceAmerican Cancer Society Cancer Action Network

Mark Fleury, PhD is a policy principal for the American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network (ACS CAN). He specializes in research, drug development, and regulatory policies along with other science and technology related projects. He has worked extensively on reform of diagnostic testing oversight, helped lead a coalition in 2016 that authored a landscape report on drug development challenges in pediatric cancer, and led another coalition in 2017 that created a report and recommendations focused on overcoming cancer clinical trial enrollment barriers. He continues to lead a group of stakeholders in activities directed at implementing the recommendations arising from that report, and has collaborated on multiple peer-reviewed papers on clinical trial enrollment barriers. He currently sits on the steering committee of the Targeted Agent and Profiling Utilization Registry (TAPUR) Study, which examines the use of targeted anticancer agents used off-label in clinical settings, and has been invited to participate in clinical trial advisory groups for the American Society of Clinical Oncology (ASCO) and the National Cancer Institute (NCI). Throughout his work Mark has striven to incorporate patient perspectives into inherently sciencebased issues, advocating for the inclusion of patients as partners throughout the bench to bedside translation of science.

NOMINATIONS FOR THE CANCER COMMUNITY SERVICE AND EXCELLENCE IN CANCER PATIENT NAVIGATION AWARDS NOW OPEN



Nominations are now open for the first annual Phillip H. Street Cancer Community Service Award and the 2023 Matt Mumber MD Award for Excellence in Cancer Patient Navigation. The new community service award is named for the late Phillip H. Street (pictured left), a longtime friend of Georgia CORE. An award of \$5,000 will be given to an individual or partnership that has contributed exceptional service to Georgia's cancer community. Phillip served as legal counsel to Georgia CORE for nearly 20 years and was instrumental in the organization's success.

The navigation award is funded and given by the Cancer Patient Navigators of Georgia each year to an individual in the amount of \$2,000. It began in February 2013 and was named for Dr. Mumber (pictured right), a radiation oncologist in Rome, Ga., with a goal to emulate his passion for patient-centered care.
