Risks of COVID-19

Type of cancer

Cancer metastasis

Treatment regimen

Increased contact with healthcare system

Co-morbidities

Recent Studies



Two recent studies

- 218 patients in New York in March and April 2020
- 105 cancer patients in Wuhan, China in January and February 2020

Findings

- Covid-19 patients with cancer had more severe outcomes
- Most severe outcomes:
 - Hematological cancers
 - Lung cancer
 - Stage IV cancer
 - Surgical patients
 - Immunotherapy
 - Certain co-morbidities

- Anxiety over delayed treatment
- Financial Insecurity
- Loss of Insurance




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Recommendations



- Social distancing
- Frequent hand washing
- Don't touch face
- Wear masks outside of the home
- Clean and disinfect often
- Avoid anyone who is sick or has been exposed to the coronavirus






Cancer Screening

- American Society for Clinical Oncology (ASCO) recommends delaying routine screenings
- Diagnostic screening should be on the advice of your physician

What to do

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- If in active treatment, consult your oncologist
- If not in active treatment, contact your primary care physician
- Do no show up to a physician office or ER without calling first
- If urgent call 911 and alert them of possible exposure



Testing for COVID-19

- CDC has determined people with underlying conditions are Priority 2
- Depends on availability
- Clinicians urged to use professional judgement
- Prevalence in area may affect testing





Practice Changes

- Telehealth visits
- Limiting visitors
- Pre-screening
- Requiring masks
- Social distancing

Adjustments in Therapies



Switching dosing schedules for in-person visits



Changing to oral therapies



Short course radiation or hypo-fractionated radiation may be used



Time between restaging scans and labs may be increased



Opportunities for clinical trials diminished



Providing some therapies at home


Other family member plans

Marketplace


COBRA

- Continuity
- Can be expensive
- Consider expenses already incurred



Family Member's Plan

- Spouse and adult child under 26
- Expensive
- Qualifying event



Medicaid

- Income based
- Put in an application
 - <u>https://www.healthcare.gov/blog/who-qualifies-for-medicaid/</u>
 - Will let you know if you qualify
 - If don't qualify, may be eligible for tax credits



Marketplace

- Loss of insurance is a qualifying event 60 days
- Different Tiers
- May qualify for tax credits or premium subsidies
